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THE STATE COUNCIL OF HOMOEOPATHY DIPLOMA IN HOMOEOPATHIC MEDICINE AND SURGERY (FOUR YEARS COURSE) EXAMINATION REGULATION, 1982

No. 2788-4161-XVII-Med-IV dated 23rd **October** 1982.- In exercise of the powers conferred by clauses (e) and (f) of sub-section (1) of section 52 of the Madhya Pradesh Homoeopathy Parishad Adhiniyam, 1976 (No. 19 of 1976), the State Council of Homoeopathy Madhya Pradesh, with the previous sanction of the State Government, vide Public Health Memo No. 2578-2607- XVII-Med-4, dated 1st October, 1982, hereby makes the following regulations, namely :-

PART A-PRELIMINARY

1. Short title.- These regulations may be called the State Council of Homoeopathy Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery (Four Years Course) Examination Regulation, 1982.

2. Definitions.- In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires,-

- (a) "Act" means the Madhya Pradesh Homoeopathy Parishad Adhiniyam, 1976 (No. 19 of 1976);
- (ii) "Appendix" means an appendix appended to these regulations;
- (iii) "Course" means the course of study for the Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery prescribed by the Central Council of Homoeopathy, New Delhi, and in the event of course not being so prescribed by the Central Council, the course of study prescribed by the Council under these regulations;
- (iv) "Examination" means the Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery (Four years Course) Examination conducted by the Council;
- (v) "Examination Officer" means the officer conducting the examination;
- (vi) "Government" means the Government of Madhya Pradesh;
- (vii) "Homoeopathic College / Institution" means a Homoeopathic Medical College or an institution recognized or established by the State Council of Homoeopathy or State Government;
- (viii) "President" means the president / or Administrator of the State Council of Homoeopathy;
- (ix) "Registrar" means the Registrar of Council;
- (x) "Regular / Student" means a student who has prosecuted a regular course of study in an institution / College affiliated or recognised or established by the Council and seeks admission to an examination of the Council as such student.

PART B-ADMISSION TO THE DIPLOMA IN HOMOEOPATHIC MEDICINE AND SURGERY COURSE

3. The Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery course will be of four years duration including a compulsory internship of six months duration after passing the final Examination for Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine Surgery.

¹[4. Only such candidate shall be eligible for admission to the first year of the Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Course who has-

- (a) passed intermediate or High Secondary Examination (10+2) or its equivalent examination with Physics, Chemistry and Biology as the subjects; and
- (b) attained the age of 17 years on or before 31st December of the year immediately preceeding the date of his admission in the first year of the course.]

5. The medium of instruction and examination shall be in Hindi or English at the option of the

candidate.

6. The examination fee and other fees payable to the Council shall be as specified in Appendix.

7. (1) A candidate desirous of admission in an affiliated / recognized college shall submit an application to the Principal / head of the College alongwith a certificate as to his conduct signed by the Principal / Head of the institution last attended and necessary fees and other documents, on or before the last date notified by the Principal / Head of the College in this behalf from time to time.

(1) The Principal / Head of the institution to which a candidate has sought admission may call upon the candidate to satisfy him as regards his conduct, medical fitness and other terms and conditions for admission specified in these regulations.

8. All admissions to any institutions recognised by the council or established by it or the State Government shall be subject to confirmation of the Council, in case of any admission is not found in conformity with the provisions of these regulations the Council shall have in its absolute discretion power to refuse admission to any of the examination with respect to the course which the student might have studied or the Council may, in its absolute discretion, withdraw the diploma awarded to any candidate if it transpires that such student has as a result of fraud, misrepresentation, mistake or any other vitiating factors obtained admission to the course.

9. All admissions in the recognised institutions for such courses of studies shall be closed on such date as the Council may notify from time to time in this behalf.

10. Nothing in these regulation shall prohibit the Council to limit the number of admissions to any course of study in any recognised institution subject to availability of accommodation and facilities provided for such course.

11. A student admitted to any recognised institution, shall be recognised as a member of that institution as soon as his application for Enrolment Certificate is forwarded to the Council.

12. No candidate shall be admitted to any examination of the Council unless he has been enrolled as a student of the council, and has paid enrolment fee as specified in the appendix.

13. The application in Form one (A) for enrolment together with the enrolment fee and other documents required to be submitted, shall reach the office of the Council through the head of the institution to which he has been admitted, within 30 days of the last date of admission in the college, before expiry of or such period as the Council may in its discretion extend.

14. The Registrar shall maintain a register and a card index of all the students enrolled with the Council. The card shall contain information required for identification purposes as the time of enrolment and shall be supplemented by the Registrar, in which information regarding readmission, transfer, success or failure at an examination or leaving the institution, shall be entered.

15. On enrolment, every student shall receive from the Registrar an enrolment certificate in Form Two (B) showing the enrolment number which his name has been entered in the register and that number shall be quoted by the student in all communications to the Council and subsequent applications for admission to an examination of the Council.

16. A duplicate copy of the enrolment certificate may be issued on payment of the fee specified in this behalf in the appendix.

17. The head of the institution recognised by the Council shall forward, after careful examination of the original documents, to the Registrar the enrolment forms and the enrolment fees of all the students admitted in his institution and such other information as may be sought by the

Council.

18. No student shall be allowed to get himself transferred from one institution to another without prior permission of the Council and issue of transfer certificate by the Principal of the College, in the From Two.

19. Subject to the provision of regulation 18 no student shall be allowed to get himself transferred from one institution to another, unless he passes first professional Examination from the institution in which he has already taken admission and the President of the Council considers the reasons put forth by the student for transfer to be genuine.

20. (1) Notwithstanding anything contained in these regulations if a student desires to get himself transferred from the institution after commencement of the session or during the session, and wishes to join another institution, he shall-

- (i) make an application in writing to the Registrar through the principal of his intention to leave the institution stating the reasons for the same;
- (ii) make payment of all college dues and other dues as required under these regulations;
- (iii) refund whatever scholarship or any other sum paid to him from the college fund, if the college requires him to do so;
- (iv) pay a fee as specified in Appendix A in this behalf to the council for change of his enrolment from one institution to another institution.

(2) The Principal shall forward the application for transfer to the Council alongwith his comments.

The principal shall issue transfer Certificate only after, receiving permission from the President of the Council and thereafter the student shall ordinarily be eligible for admission to any other affiliated/recognised college,

21. As respects any question arising out of the transfer of the student from one institution to another institution and such matters connected therewith for which nothing is specifically provided in these regulations, the decision of the Registrar shall be final,

22. When a student has been found guilty of grave misconduct or persistent idleness or breach of discipline within or outside the jurisdiction of the College or Council, the Principle of the College in which such student is studying, or the President of the Council may, according to the nature and gravity of the case, after giving an opportunity of hearing to the offending student -

- (a) suspend him from attending classes for a specified period.
- (b) expel him from the institution.
- (c) rusticate him for a period not exceeding one academic year,
- (d) disqualify him from appearing at the ensuing examination of the Council :

Provided that the principal or the Registrar, as the case may be, shall have the power to suspend a student immediately if such Principal or Registrar on information or otherwise has reason to believe that the student is *prina facie* guilty of an act of grave misconduct even without giving prior opportunity of hearing to the student.

23. No Student who has been so expelled or rusticated shall be admitted to another institutions during the period of his punishment, as may be specified in the order of expulsion or rustication as the case may be.

24. All cases of expulsion / rustications shall be reported to the Council for confirmation. The Principal shall, however, have power to suspend a student temporarily form the college pending

enquiry into his conduct in connection with an alleged misconduct.

PART C-SCHEME OF DIPLOMA IN HOMOEOPATHIC MEDICINE AND SURGERY EXAMINATION

25. (1) There shall be three examinations, namely

- (i) First Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Examination, at the end of the first year of the Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery course.
- (ii) Second Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Examination, at the end of the second year of the Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery course.
- (iii) Third Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Examination (Final) .at the end of three and a half years of Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Course.

(2) The examinations shall be held twice a year, main, and supplementary, on such dates, time and place or places as the council may from time to time determine.

26. First Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Examinations.- (1) A candidate shall be eligible for admission to the first diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Examination, to be held after the completion of the first academic year, who has attended a regular course of study in an affiliated / recognised college for atleast one academic year to the satisfaction of the Principal / Head of the institution and has been enrolled with the Council as a regular student in the said college.

(2) Second Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Examination.- A candidate who has passed First Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Examination or Diploma in Homoeopathy and Biochemistry Examinations of the State Council of Homoeopathy, Madhya Pradesh or of the Ex-Board of Homoeopathy and Biochemic Systems of Medicine, Madhya Pradesh and has attended a regular course of study of one academic year (second year) in affiliated / recognised college to the satisfaction of the Principal / Head of the institution, shall be eligible for the admission to the Second Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Examination to be held at end of two years of Diploma In Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery course.

(3) Third Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Examination.- A candidate who has passed Second Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Examination and has attended a regular course of study of the Third Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Course for a period of 1 1/4 years in an affiliated / recognised college to the satisfaction of the Principal / Head of the institution will be eligible for admission to the Third Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Examination (final).

Explanation-For the purposes of this regulation "A regular course of Study" means attendance is atleast 75% of lectures and practical / clinical delivered or held, separately in a subject in a particular academic year or session:

Provided that the deficiency in percentage of attendance not exceeding 20% of the total number of lectures delivered and practical / clinics held in each subject may be condoned by the President of the Council on the recommendation of the Principal / Head of the college in case of prolonged illness or any other valid reasons.

27. (1) Every candidate for the First Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Examination shall be required to pass in the following subjects of study

- (i) Anatomy;
- (ii) Physiology;
- (iii) Pharmacy ;
- (iv) Materia Medica (20 polychrst drug).

(2) Every candidate for the Second Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Examination shall be required to pass in the following subject of study :-

- (i) Pathology, Bacteriology and parasitology;
- (ii) Forensic Medicine and Toxicology;
- (iii) Social and preventive Medicine including health, education and family welfare medicine;
- (iv) Materia Medica (56 Polychest drugs);
- (v) Organon (upto apho. 70).

(3) Every candidate for the Third Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Examination shall be required to pass in all the following subjects :-

- (i) Practice of Medicine, (including mental diseases and Homoeopathic Therapeutics)
- (ii) Surgery (including E.N.T., Eye, Dental diseases and Homoeopathic Therapeutics);
- (iii) Obstetrics and Gynaecology, including pediatrics;
- (iv) Materia Medica, (70 drugs);
- (v) Organon and Philosophy;
- (vi) Repertory.

28. (1) The examination in each subject shall consist of written, oral and / or practical (clinical) test. Three hours shall be allowed for each written paper (test) and one hour for practical / clinical test.

(2) Pass mark for each subject shall be 45% of the total marks in written papers and oral and practical.

(3) Candidates securing 75% or more marks in a subject shall be declared to have obtained Distinction (honour) in that subject provided that the candidate passes in all the subjects in the examination at the first attempt.

(2) Scheme of Examinations shall be as follows

29. Notwithstanding anything contained in these regulations, if an examinee appearing at an examination fails in subjects not exceeding two but secures more than the minimum aggregate marks required may have the deficiency of his marks in the subject or subjects in which he fails condoned up to the limit of five marks.

30. As soon as possible after the examination is over, the Council shall publish a list of successful candidates arranged in the following manner:-

- the names, roll number and the marks obtained of the first ten candidates in order of merit, and
- the roll numbers of others arranged serially.

31. After passing the Third Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery (Final) Examination, a student will have to undergo training of six months in the form of compulsory internship in a Hospital or Dispensary recognised by the Council, to the satisfaction of the Principal or Head of the institution.

33. Supplementary Examination.- A candidate who has passed at least in one subject may be admitted to supplementary examination in the subject or subjects of that part of the examination in which he has failed, to be held ordinarily after six weeks from the publication of results on payment of the fee in this behalf in Appendix alongwith an application in Form three.

34. If a candidate obtains passing marks in the subject or subjects at the supplementary examination or the subsequent examination, he shall be declared to have passed at the examination as a whole.

35. If such a candidate fails in the subject or subjects at the supplementary examination in the subject or subjects concerned, he may appear in that subject or subjects at the next annual examination on production of a certificate (in addition to the certificates required under these regulations) to the effect that he had attended to the satisfaction of the Principal, a further course of study for a period of next academic year in the subject or subjects in which he had failed :

Provided that all the subjects of the examination shall be completed within four chances, including the main and the supplementary, to be counted from the date when the complete examination becomes due for the first time.

36. If a candidate fails to pass in all the subjects within the prescribed four chances, he shall be required to prosecute again the course of study in all the subjects of the examination concerned for the academic year to the satisfaction of the Head of the college and shall appear for examination in all the subjects :

Provided that if a student appearing for the third Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery Examination has only one subject to pass at the last out of the prescribed chances, he shall be allowed one more chance to appear at the next examination in that particular subject and shall complete the examination with this special chance, failing which he shall be required to take full examination of the third Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery examination.

37. The Council may under exceptional circumstances in its discretion partially or in to cancel any examination of one or more centers ¹ conducted by it and arrange for conducting reexamination in those subjects at these centers as early as possible from the date of such cancellation or as the case may warrant.

PART D-EXAMINATION GENERAL

38. Every candidate for admission to an examination shall submit an application to the Principal / Head of the institution, in Form three addressed to the Registrar, stating the examination and the subject in which he desires to present himself for the examination through the Principal of the College / Head of the institution along with the examination mark-sheet fee as specified in this behalf in Appendix and other certificates and documents as may be asked for along with the application form on or before the last date fixed by the Principal / Head of the institution in this behalf from time to time.

39.(1) Application submitted by the candidate together with the examination fee and marks sheet fee shall be forwarded by the Principal / Head of the institution so as to reach the Registrar on or

before the last date fixed for the purpose by the Council.

(2) With respect to each application the Principal of the College / Head of institution shall certify that the candidate ñ

(1) possesses minimum academic qualifications for appearing at the examination to which he seeks admission;

(2) is of a good conduct.

40. The principal of a college or the Head of institution may detain a candidate from appearing at an examination who -

- (a) does not clear the outstanding dues of the college; or
- (b) does not return the college articles and uniform or the cost thereof in case of loss; or
- (c) has committed serious acts of indiscipline which may attract expulsion or rustication from the institution.

41. No person who has been expelled from any college shall be admitted to any examination for a specified period shall be admitted to such examination during such specified period.

42. (1) No person who has been rusticated from any college shall be admitted to any examination during the period of rustication.

(2) No person who has been debarred for appearing at any examination for a specified period shall be admitted to such examination during such specified period.

43. An application for admission to an examination received by the Registrar after the last date fixed by the Council ¹[xxx] may be entertained on payment of a late fee as specified for the purpose in Appendix A.

44. Notwithstanding anything' contained in these regulations the President may, in special cases in which he is satisfied that the delay in submitting application for admission to an examination is not due to negligence on the part of the candidate and that it would be a great hardship to the candidate if his application is rejected, allow an application which is otherwise complete in all respects to be entertained with the specified late fee even though the same is received after the expiry of the period of fifteen days mentioned in regulation 43.

45. (1) The Registrar shall issue an admission card in the prescribed form in favour of a candidate if the application of the candidate is complete in all respects and the prescribed fees have been paid by the candidate.

(2) The admission card issued- in favour of a candidate and the permission given may be withdrawn, at any stage if it is found that -

- (a) the admission card was issued or the permission granted was given through mistake or the candidate was not eligible to appear at the examination;
- (b) any of the particulars given or documents submitted by the candidate with the application for enrolment, admission to a college or a admission to an examination is false or incorrect.

(3) The Registrar may, if he is satisfied that an admission card has been lost or destroyed, grant a duplicate admission card on payment of a further ²[fee of Rs. 20 (twenty)]. Such card shall contain in a prominent place the óDUPLICATE.ô

46. A candidate shall not be admitted into the examination hall unless he produces the admission card before the Centre Superintendent or invigilator or satisfy such officers that it shall be

produced. A candidate shall produce his admission card whenever required by the Centre Superintendent or the invigilator.

47. (1) A candidate who, due to sickness or other cause is unable to present himself at an examination shall not receive a refund of his fees :

Provided that the president may, in a case in which he is satisfied, the cause was beyond the control of the candidate, may order, for adjustment of the following portion of the fee towards the fees liable to be paid by the. candidate for the immediately next examination, namely

- (i) Examination fee after deduction ¹[75] % of the fee.
- (ii) Fee for the statement of marks.

Other fees paid by the candidates shall lapse to the Council. Application for such adjustment, from a candidate accompanied with a medical certificate of illness, if applicable, must be sent so as to reach the Registrar not earlier than 10 days and not later than 30 days from the date of commencement of the examination at which the candidate was to appear.

(2) The fees paid by a candidate who is debarred from appearing at an examination due to shortage of attendance or late submission of application may be refunded through the Principal of the college concerned before appearing at the examination or during the period of taking examination may be refunded in full to his guardian or to the legal heirs of such candidate.

(3) The entire fees paid by a candidate, whose application for appearing at an examination is cancelled on account of submission of forged documents or giving false particulars or who is debarred from appearing at the examination or expelled or detained shall stand forfeited.

48. Any candidate, who has appeared at an examination, may apply to the Registrar for retotalling of his marks in the written papers in one or more subjects but not more than three subjects and rechecking of his marks. Such application shall reach the Registrar along with true copy of the mark Sheet not later than ²[15] days from the date of declaration of the result of the examination. Such application must be accompanied by a fee specified for the purpose in Appendix A.

²[xxx]

49. A duplicate copy of mark sheet may be issued on payment of a fee as specified in Annexure A for the purpose.

50. Duplicate copy of the Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery shall not be granted except in cases in which the President is satisfied on the production of an affidavit on a stamped paper of proper value required by law for the time being in force that the applicant has lost his Diploma or that it has been destroyed and the applicant is in real need for a duplicate. In such cases a duplicate of the diploma may be granted on receipt of a fee as specified in Appendix A for the purpose.

PART E-CONDUCT OF EXAMINATION

51. The President of the Council shall be overall incharge of the examination and it shall be held under his direct superintendence.

52. The Registrar of the Council, or any other person appointed by the Council to act as an examination officer, shall in consultation with the President of the Council, make all arrangements for

the conduct of the examination. Registrar / Examination Officer shall maintain due secrecy in everything that is necessary for the conduct of the examination till the results are declared.

53. (1) The Examination Officer, not being the Registrar, shall keep all the confidential records, and correspondence regarding appointment of examiners, paper setters, printing of question papers. Payment to the press shall be made through and in the name of the Examination Officer in order to maintain due secrecy of the name and place of the press, till the publication of the result, and after the result is declared and published all records and materials pertaining to examination shall be handed over to the Registrar, who shall cause the same to be kept in a safe place.

(2) Except as otherwise decided by the Executive Committee of the Council, the examination answer books and the documents regarding the marks obtained by the examinees, except the tabulated results shall be destroyed and otherwise disposed of by the Registrar after 6 month from the date of the declaration of the results, or in case of any legal proceeding challenging the result of the examinations are filed, after such proceedings are finally decided, whichever is later.

54. The Registrar shall publish the programme for the conduct of the examination and the dates by which applications and fees for examination shall be paid by the examinees.

55. Registrar / Examination Officer shall, in consultation with the President, appoint Centre Superintendent for each examination centre and shall issue instructions and provide guidance as and when necessary.

56. The Centre Superintendent of the examination at each centre shall receive the question papers in properly sealed covers from the Examination Officer and shall be personally responsible for the safe custody of question papers and the answer books sent to him and shall render to the Council office complete account of used and unused question papers and answer books. He shall make seating arrangements for the candidates and other arrangements necessary for the smooth conduct of the examination at the centre.

57. The Centre Superintendent shall appoint invigilators and other staff, who shall receive such remuneration as may be fixed by the Council from time to time, He shall supervise the work of invigilators and other staff working under him and shall conduct the examinations strictly according to the instructions issued to him by the Council.

58. The Centre Superintendent shall whenever necessary, send a confidential report to the Registrar about the conduct of the examination mentioning therein the performance of the invigilators and the general the behaviour of the examinees. He shall send a daily report on the number of examinees attending examination each day, absentees roll numbers, current accounts of the answer books, and such other information, relating to the examination being held at the centre, as may be considered necessary and any other matter which he thinks fit to be brought to the notice of the Council.

59. The Council may sanction advance money for each centre and the Centre Superintendent shall be responsible for maintenance and submission to the Registrar of the detailed accounts of the advance money received and expenditure incurred in connection with the conduct of the examination.

60. The Council may change the examination centre of the examinees irrespective of a collage to which they belong, at any time, it deems proper without assigning any reasons.

61. (1) In the examination hall the candidate shall be under the disciplinary control of the Centre Superintendent and he shall obey his instructions. A candidate, in the event of his disobeying orders of the Centre Superintendent being undisciplined or using unfair means or attempting to use unfair means or, arrogant and misbehavior towards the Centre Superintendent or the invigilator, or

any other member of staff of the centre, he may be excluded from that day's examination and if he persists in his misbehaviour, he may be excluded from the rest of the examination by the Centre Superintendent.

(2) If a candidate brings any dangerous weapon or an object that can be used for assault within the precincts of the examination centre, and/or acts in a violent manner or uses force or makes a display of force towards the Centre Superintendent, or invigilator or an examinee in its precincts endangering the personal safety or acts in a manner likely to obstruct the authorities in the discharge of their duties the Centre Superintendent may expel the candidate from the centre and may for this purpose use or cause to be used such force as may be necessary and he may in addition take police help. A candidate so expelled shall not be allowed to appear in the subsequent papers.

(3) In every case where an action is taken by the Centre Superintendent under clauses (1) or (2) a full report shall be sent to the Council and the Executive Committee may, having regard to the gravity of the behaviour or misconduct of the candidate, further punish him by canceling his examination and/or debarring him from appearing at any of the examinations of the Council for one or more years in either case after giving the candidate a reasonable opportunity to show cause against proposed action and after considering any explanation submitted by the candidate.

62. The sealed covers containing the question papers marked for the day, will be opened before 10 minutes of the commencement of the examination and the sealed cover will be initialed and dated with time by the Centre Superintendent and an invigilator certifying that the seals were intact and broken opened before them. The Centre Superintendent and invigilator shall before distribution of question papers amongst examinees, satisfy themselves that the sealed covers contain relevant question papers only.

63. No identification mark of the centre or the Centre Superintendent shall be made on the cover or any where on the answer books. After the completion of the question paper, each day, all answer books shall be checked and verified in order to ensure that entries on the cover page made by the examinees are complete and correct, and thereafter the answer books shall be properly sealed and certified by him and an invigilator giving time and date of sealing the packet and shall be sent to the examination officer, in accordance with the instructions given in this behalf by the examination officer, from time to time.

64. It shall be the duty of the Centre Superintendent to ensure that an examinee is the same person who had filled in the form of application for appearing at the examination by way of checking the photograph pasted on the form and signatures (one already on the form and the other to be obtained in the examination hall) in cases of all examinees.

65. Save in genuine cases occasional due to illness, accident or any other sufficient cause no examinee shall be allowed in the examination hall after half an hour of the commencement of the examination and no examinee shall leave the examination hall within half an hour of the start of the examination for any purpose whatsoever. The invigilators shall each day obtain the signatures in a given paper of all the examinees present and check the admission card. He shall also verify that each examinee has entered correctly the required details at appropriate places on the cover page of the answer book before he is allowed to leave the hall.

66. The Centre Superintendent shall take action against an examinee, who is found using or attempting to use unfair means in the examination hall or within the premises of the examination centre during the hours of examination, in the following manner

- (i) the examinee shall be called upon to surrender all the objectionable material found in his possession including the answer books and a memorandum shall be prepared by the invigilator with date and time to be noted thereon and the same shall be signed by the

- Superintendent;
- (ii) The statements of the examinee and the invigilator shall be recorded in form five. In case of refusal by the examinee to give his statement and to surrender the materials used as unfair means, such a note shall be given by the Superintendent;
 - (iii) The examinee shall be issued a fresh answer book marked "DUPLICATE using unfair means" to attempt answer within the remaining time prescribed for the examination;
 - (iv) all the materials so collected and the entire evidence alongwith a statement of the examinee and the answer book duly initialled shall be forwarded to the Examination Officer by name, in a separate confidential sealed registered packet marked "Unfair means" alongwith the observations of the Centre Superintendent;
 - (v) The material so collected from the examinee together with both the answer books namely answer book collected while using unfair means and the other supplied afterwards will be sent to the examiner by the Examination Officer for assessing both the answer books separately and to report if the examinee has actually used unfair means in view of the material collected;
 - (vi) The cases of the use of unfair means at the examinations as reported by the Centre Superintendent alongwith the report of the examiner shall be placed before the Examination Committee for examination and decision in relation thereto.

67. All cases of unfair means and breach of discipline in the examination, shall be recorded in the daily reports by the Centre Superintendent and witnessed by an invigilator present.

68. The Registrar may, on the recommendation of the Centre Superintendent appoint an amanuensis to write down dictation pertaining to answers to questions at the examination on behalf of an examinee who is unable to write himself on account of blindness short sightlessness or sudden illness, provided that such an amanuensis shall be a person of lesser qualification and non-medical person.

69. The Council may from time to time appoint Inspector or Board of Inspectors to see that the conduct of the examination is strictly according to the rules and procedures laid down. In the event of the Inspector pointing out serious breach of rules or procedures, the President may take such action as may be necessary including postponement or cancellation, wholly or in part of the examination at the centre and if any such action is taken a report of the action taken with reasons shall be made to the Executive Committee at its next meeting.

70. The Executive Committee may cancel an examination at centres if it is satisfied that there has been a leakage of question papers or any other irregularity of serious nature warranting such a step.

71. The Council may appoint an Examination Committee which shall -

- i. approve the panel and list of paper setters, examiners practical examiners external and internal;
- ii. issue such general instructions for the guidance of the Examiners, Central Superintendent, Tabulators, Collectors as it considers necessary for the proper discharge of their duties;
- iii. perform such other works in connection with conduct of examination as may be entrusted to it by the President from time to time.

72. The President shall appoint tabulators and collectors and/or such persons as are necessary for preparation of result sheet. The President and/or the Examinations Committee may issue general instructions for the guidance of the examiners, setters. Centre Superintendents tabulators, collectors, as it considers necessary for the proper discharge of their duties and preparation of the result of the examination.

73. The Examination Committee may suggest from time to time any alterations or modifications in rules and procedures about the conduct of examination and preparation of the examination.

74. If a candidate has any communication to make on the subject of his/her examination paper, it shall be made in writing to the Registrar direct, who shall, if necessary put the application with his notes before the Result Committee for consideration.

75. The Council shall constitute a Result Committee for each examination whose function shall be-

- (i) to scrutinise and pass the result of the examination after satisfying itself that the results as a whole and in various subjects are in conformity with the usual standard;
- (ii) to scrutinise, complaint against question papers and to take necessary action;
- (iii) to decide cases of candidates whose answer books may have been lost in transit;
- (iv) to report to the Council if any action is to be taken against any examination Centre Superintendent or invigilator;
- (v) to perform such other duties as the Council may entrust from time to time.

76. The result as passed by the Result Committee shall be declared by the Registrar and shall be published on the notice board of the Council and simultaneously be communicated to the Principals of the colleges concerned.

77. The Result Committee shall have power to detain the result of any candidate of a centre for such reason or reasons which may warrant such an action. The result so detained may be declared when the reason/or objections for which it was detained have been removed or the same may be cancelled and fresh examination may be ordered by the Council; if such a course is considered necessary by it.

78. The mark sheets for each candidates shall be prepared in such form as may be approved by the Council from time to time and shall be sent to each candidate through the institution

79. The remuneration of the paper setters, Examiners, Superintendents, Invigilators, Tabulators and Collectors and the deductions to be made in remuneration for errors noticed shall be such as may be determined by the council from time to time.

80. (1) As regards any doubt arising about the interpretation or in application of these regulations and as regards such any other matters for which nothing specifically has been provided under these regulations the decision of the Council shall be final.

(2) The Council shall have power to revise or make addition and alterations in the forms appended to these regulations, as it may deem fit.

PART: F-SYLLABUS AND CURRICULUM

The following shall be the syllabus for the Diploma in Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery:-

FIRST DIPLOMA IN HOMOEOPATHIC MEDICINE & SURGERY EXAMINATION

Anatomy :

A complete course of human anatomy with a general working knowledge of the different Anatomical part of the human body, general anatomical positions, and broad relations of the viscera muscles, blood vessels, nerves and lymphatics, demonstration through prepared dissected specimen regional and surface anatomy, surface markings and radiographs of the normal subjects.

Practicals :

A course of dissection of the human body may be arranged wherever possible. Burden of dissection can be reduced by demonstration of the dissected parts of the body, demonstration of surface, parking of important viscera, arteries, nerves, regions of clinical importance of the brain body land marks. Paper No. 1 upper extremity, head, face, neck and brain. Paper No. 2 Lower extremity, thorax, abdomen and pelvis.

2. Physiology

A course of systematic lectures in the general principles and facts in physiology.

Paper No. 1 :

Histology, blood and lymph, cardiovascular system, reticuloendothelial system, spleen, respiratory system, urinary system, skin regulation of body, temperature, sense organs, nerve muscle physiology.

Paper No. 2 :	
Endocrine organs, nervous system, reproductive system, digestive system, metabolism, enzymes, nutrition.	
Practical:	Identification of histological specimen of tissues and organs, Bones, Cartilage, fibrous tissue, cellular tissue, veins, arteries, liver, lung, appendix Fallopian tube, cross section of spinal nerve, lymph gland, spleen, kidney.

2.	Preparation of staining of blood films total and differential count of blood cells.
3.	Use of the haemoglobinometer and sphygmomanometer. Demonstration of some experiments in connection with nerve muscle physiology.

Introduction, Scope, weights and measures and scales, instruments and appliances, sources of drugs, Drug vehicles, methods of preparation of drugs (Mother tinctures, solution, potencies and triturations) fluxions potency, conversion of trituration into liquid form, external applications.

Prescriptions its writing and validity pharmacology standardisation of drugs and vehicles, pharmacy legislation, general laboratory methods, Biological/Mechanical and/or chemical characteristics of important drugs substances, Homoeopathic drug proving.

Practical :

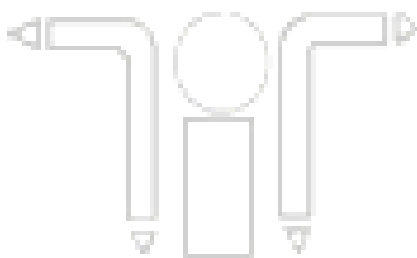

Disturbances of circulation, Disease of the Blood, Hyperanemia, Thrombosis and Embolism including infection, Oedema, Fever, Regenerative tissue changes, Hypertrophy and Hyperplasia. The healing process, healing of special structures. Degenerative tissue changes, proliferative tissue

changes, Immunity special Pathology in respect of diseases of the Blood, general consideration pernicious anaemia aplastic anaemias, chlorosis, leukemia. Disease of the circulatory system, pericarditis, aortic valve disease, Meningitis Diseases of the respiratory system, kidney, alimentary tract cirrhosis of liver Diseases of unknown causation.

Bacteriology :

The morphology, biology and pathogenic qualities of the micro organisms.

Parasitology :

The morphology, Biology and pathogenic qualities of protozoa. Entamoeba Histolytica, Malaria, Leishmania, Sporozoa plasmodium of syphilis, venereal diseases, rat bite fever, ascariasis, lumbricoides, oxyuriasis, varicella, measles, Banaroti.

Viruses :

Smallpox, Chicken Pox, Measles, Common cold, Herpes Zoster, Acute Anterior, Poly Myelitis, Influenza Encephalitis, Tetanus, Epidemic infective hepatitis Primary atypical Pneumonia

Practical:

1. Histopathological studies of tissues and organs.
2. Microscopic specimens of pathogenic organisms. ,
3. 'Technique of collection,' preparation and examination of morbid materials blood, urine, pus, sputum, exudates.

Forensic Medicine and Toxicology :

Legal procedures.- Medical Jurisprudence, courts and their jurisdiction.

Medical Ethics, and different Acts, Examination, identification of persons living and dead, parts, bones, stains etc. Death Medical, Post mortem, Assaults, Wounds, injuries and death by violence, blood stains, seminal stains, Burns, scalds, lightning, stroke, starvation, pregnancy, delivery, abortion, infanticide, sexual crimes, Insanity, Toxicology, Poisons in general, symptoms, treatment, postmortem appearance and tests.

2. Medical legal post mortem:

Recording post mortem appearance, forwarding material to chemical examiners, Interpretation of laboratory and chemical examiners, findings weapons, organic inorganic poisonous substances, poisonous plants, Demonstration of charts diagrams, models. X-ray films etc. of Medical legal interest. Weapons, organic and inorganic poisons, poisonous plants.

3. Preventive and Social Medicine :

(Health education and Family Planning).

(1) Physiological Hygiene :

Food and Nutrition, Air, Light and sunshine effect of climate, personal Hygiene.

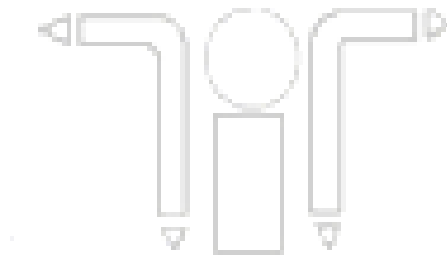
